The My Lai Massacre was one of the most influential events that happened during the Vietnam War. My journey of learning about the My Lai Massacre arose from my interest in Asian American history. I learnt about the My Lai Massacre while reading Howard Zinn's *A Young People's History of the United States*. In the chapter about the Vietnam War, Zinn included a page about the brutal massacre. I was intrigued. This being my first time participating in National History Day, I was excited to delve deeper into the heartbreaking and hidden details of the Vietnam War.

I first began researching using my school's Encyclopedia Britannica platform. It had a short article about the Vietnam War and a list of important events. However, it did not mention the massacre. I started from the list of sources that the author used and branched out. A paper, "Atrocity, Authenticity and American Exceptionalism: (Ir)rationalizing the Massacre at My Lai," and a book, *The My Lai Massacre in American History and Memory*, written by historian Kendrick Oliver provided me with newspapers and information. I also found a website that laid out the impacts the My Lai Massacre caused. This is how I learned about the trial of Calley and how Ronald Ridenhour revealed the gruesome details about the massacre to the public. Then, I tracked down the photographs. Some were available through the Library of Congress and Getty Images, but others required further investigation. Since most of the images taken during the massacre were by Ronald Haeberle, I used his name as a keyword to find several photographs.

Before I began to construct my website, I sketched out a rough picture of what I wanted the site to look like. Using the short History Day paper that I wrote for my Language Arts class, I laid out all the sections. I just needed to find the right photos to go with my website.
